COUNTERCULTURE VS. SUBCULTURE: KEY DIFFERENCES

CONFLICT THEORY

CONFLICT THEORY POSITS THAT COUNTERCULTURES ARISE FROM SOCIAL INEQUALITIES AND TENSIONS BETWEEN DOMINANT AND SUBORDINATE GROUPS. COUNTERCULTURAL MOVEMENTS REPRESENT RESISTANCE AGAINST OPPRESSIVE POWER STRUCTURES, SEEKING TO REDISTRIBUTE POWER AND RESOURCES.

SYMBOLIC INTERACTIONISM

From a functionalist viewpoint, countercultures serve a societal role by highlighting social problems and prompting cultural adaptation or reform. They act as agents of change, facilitating social evolution by questioning established norms.
